Tip of the Day:

Quilt Canada 2014 – What A TRIP!!!

In March, I decided that it was time for me to attend a national guilting conference again. My last trip to one of these events was to St. Johns, NL in 2008...6 years ago already! Many members of our guild contributed inches to the Walk to Brock', and I wanted to see what it was all about. So, on June 9th, I boarded my flight to Toronto, then a shuttle bus to St. Catherines, the location of Brock University and Quilt Canada 2014. The first shock for me was the volume of traffic on the freeway heading to the Niagara Peninsula. Thank goodness I had not rented a car! The shuttle driver knew exactly where I needed to go, and took me there. The Student Residence block where I stayed was comfortable, and convenient for access to the classes I took, the shows on campus, and meals; just a short walk across the lovely treed campus.

I had chosen two classes, the first was a one day class with Jan Krentz, a wonderful teacher who is exceedingly skilled at 'diamond' patterns. The project we worked on was a Lone Star guilt. The highlight for me was learning Jan's techniques for precision. She took us to a whole new level and, no, my project is not yet finished.

The next day was my planned "free day" when I was able to visit all the guilt shows happening in conjunction with Quilt Canada. First stop, the National Juried Show.....WOW!

I am so inspired by how guilters create. This show was filled with marvellous pieces, small to large, filled with colour, design, and stunning stitching. There were a number of pieces from teachers and speakers that have visited SCQG. including Terry Aske, Hilary Rice, Carol Seely, Cynthia Frenette, Susan Purney Mark. and Judy Leslie. One of the judges was Judy Villett, who has visited us and judged one of our shows. The entire show can be viewed on the CQA website, take a look if you do not receive the magazine.

Next stop was the Invitational Show, a sampling of guilts from teachers, and others which was as wonderful as the NJS (in my opinion!) One piece which I was delighted to see was by Carol Seely, titled Yesterday, Today, and Tomorrow; which I had previously seen at the Gibsons Landing Fibre Arts Festival. Onward to the Fibre Arts Network show, another stunning collection of quilted art from western Canadians. Many of these pieces can be viewed on FAN's website. Finally, I visited the Merchant Mall, what more can I say!! There were also shows by local guilds and groups, however I did not visit either of them. I was in 'overload' mode!

My second class was with Cheryl Arkison from Calgary. She is a published author, modern quilter, mother of young children, excellent teacher, and lots of fun. The class was Improvisational Piecing. No pattern! How do you start? What do you do???? I took along two sets of fabric, just in case. The project I

worked on was for a challenge that I took on from Lorna Shapiro, when she visited SCQG in the spring. Cheryl was most helpful and supportive. Her handouts were exactly what I needed; she started with 'Finding Inspiration', moved on to 'Where do I start?', and then provided a selection of techniques including Chopsticks, Slabs, and Wonky Log Cabins. I spent a wonderful two days with Cheryl and other members of the class, and came home with most of the work done on my challenge quilt. This represents a huge step forward for me, the guilt is my own creation.

One of the most interesting aspects of attending a national gathering is meeting people from beyond my lovely part of our country. There were indeed guilters from across the country, and I enjoyed meeting many of them. As a member of my first quilt guild said to me, "When we are together here, we are all sisters".

Is anyone interested in going to Quilt Canada 2015 in Lethbridge? Maybe we could carpool, or what about a Bus Trip?

Ouarter Inch Blues: Don't sing em', get your ¼" groove on from the start for no heart-ache sewing. If you don't have a quarter inch foot, you can mark the base of your machine or stitch plate with painter's tape for guidance. Also, don't assume your 1/4" is set accurately on your machine, if you would like to test it you can measure after you run a strip with a ruler, or take ¼" graph paper and set along the edge of your presser foot/marking and bring needle down and see if it hits the quarter inch line on graph paper.

What's the big deal with perfect quarter inch anyway? Well, if you are not consistent, by the time you get four or more blocks done, your whole quilt could be off by over an inch, and that is not going to work, lining up your seams. OK, you've done all this and you are going to practice, practice, practice : Now you are the "composer" of the perfect quarter inch. Don't sweat it, I'm still working on it. 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

Sunshine Quilt Show Celebrating 25 Years Of Quilting Arts— 1st: 2015 Quilt Show BANNER Challenge

BANNER CHALLENGE

"Coastal Impressions"

In keeping with our quilt show theme – "Celebrating 25 years of Quilting Arts", this challenge should be your personal reflection of coastal Impressions and how it inspires your quilting. This banner does not need to be abstract; anything goes just use your imagination.

Banner Challenge Rules

Top side Banner Width must be 25" (inches) in keeping with 25 years of quilting on the coast.

Length can be between 8-10' (feet)

Banner must have one or more PRI-MARY Colors incorporated.

50% or more must be three layers in keeping with the definition of a quilt. i.e. if you plan on using a sheer fabric then strips, appliqué or whatever other technique used needs to be three layers, three layers of anything used in the banner will be accepted. E.g. Three layers of sheer would be classified as quilted.

Banner must be Hangable from the 25" top.

Alternative to Banner:

We know that not everyone wants to create a banner, therefore, if you wish to create a table runner or bed protector or whatever. The choice is yours. The rules for the banner hold for these alternatives as well. Critical is that the width of 25" is mandatory and the lengths must still be between 8-10 feet.

You do not have to make the runner or protector double sided. However Backing used must be in keeping with the theme of your chosen work.

Get a partner or partners and create something wonderful to celebrate our 25th Anniversary, might be more fun that way.

2nd: 2015 Quilt Show Challenge: "Primary Colours and Beyond"

"Primary Colours and Beyond"

Keeping with our theme – "Celebrating 25 years of Quilting Arts", this challenge should be your personal reflection of what your years of quilting means to you. We want you to think outside your box. Create something unique that reflects how special quilting is for you and what it means to you. Make something creative for our 25th anniversary of quilting on the Sunshine Coast.

Challenge RULES:

Measurement of <u>two sides has to</u> <u>equal 25 inches</u>. i.e. if length is 12" then width would have to be 13" or if length was 6" then the width would have to be 19". You piece does not have to be symmetrical, square or rectangular. As long as *half the measurement is 25*".

Must use *only one* of the primary colors. Primary colors are pure red, yellow and blue

Must use *two tertiary colors*.

Check your color wheels or books on color to determine tertiary colors. A primary mixed with a secondary creates a tertiary colour. Example of tertiary colours: turquoise, blueviolet, red-violet, red-orange, yellow -orange and lime green. Please <u>do</u> <u>not use secondary colors</u> which are: Orange, Purple and Green.

You can use tints and shades of the tertiary colors you have chosen.

If using a background it must be neutral in colour such as: black, white, ecru, grey. Quilts must have appropriate sleeves for hanging. If sleeves are not appropriate the quilt may not get hung.

That's it for the rules; the rest is up to you. <u>Remember this is sup-</u> <u>posed to be a challenge but it</u> <u>should always be fun as well.</u> Let your creative juices flow and think outside your box. Nothing says that you have to do abstract, anything goes as long as you meet the rules. Make your challenge memorable for our 25th Anniversary.

The Challenge committee reserves the right to disqualify any quilts that do not meet all the rules.

Tablet Bag for Banquet Guests at Quilt Canada 2015

This makes a lovely size shoulder bag and is the perfect project to perfect your machine quilting on !!! The bag fits a tablet (with case) and a few little bits. Please mail your bags to: Pjam Swen, #1507 22 Ave., Coaldale, AB T1M 1E4

Materials:

Main fabric (outside of bag): 20 x 13"

Contrast fabric (inside of bag and both sides of flap) : 30 x 15"

Batting (not too thick : 30 x 13"

Thread to match.

From contrast fabric cut: 1 pce. 21/2 x 30"

1 pce. 20 x 13" plus 2 template pieces (cut with wrong sides together)

Template is at end of pattern.






Construction:

- Place template pieces one each to short end of main and contrast fabric right sides together. Sew with ¼" seam allowance. Press seams open. Don't worry is your "whoosh" goes the other way, it really doesn't matter.
- Layer batting with both pieces of fabric on top (fabrics right sides together), pin securely so it doesn't shift during sewing. Sew all the way around with ¼" seam, leaving an opening on a long seam (about 3" from a corner). Press seam allowance of opening over, so it'll be easy to sew. Trim batting along curved edge.







 Make little clips to the inside curve of the flap to close to the stitching. Trim seam allowance close to stitching at point of flap. Corner cut 90° angles.




- Turn inside out, poke out corners and flap point, not too hard !
- Topstitch the opening you left for turning VERY close to the edge
- Press edges all the way around while "rolling out" the seam
- Topstitch the curvy edge only of the flap. About 1/4" from the edge.




- Quilt the whole thing (including flap) fairly densely (to give extra body to the fabric)
- Fold together lengthwise, so that the short straight edge is ¼" from the flap seam, main fabric sides together.
- Stitch the side seams with a 1/8 to 3/16" seam allowance, making sure to "back and forth" at the top and bottom of each side.
- Turn inside out, press seams, while pushing out the seams
- Fold flap over bag and press folded edge very thoroughly. Optional: if you wish to make a
 closure on your bag, sew button on bag and make button hole in flap (marked by *).

alternately you could sew a large snap to the inside of the flap and on bag, for invisible closure.

- Using the 2½ x 30" strip of contrast fabric, fold both long sides over, so that the strip is folded in thirds (the overlapping long side should not quite make it to the fold of the other side), press. Fold in half and press again. Top stitch twice close to edge or once with twin needles.
- Fold short end over ½" and topstitch very securely on both side seams, making sure not to twist.



I hope you enjoyed making this bag and that you will like it well enough to make it for yourself as well !! Please note: the ratio length / width in the picture is a little off. It will turn out slightly wider looking.
