The quilts will then be rotated for varying lengths of time to Fibre Expressions, One-0-One, Swish Raffle posters and tickets have been fanned out for sale to Sew Easy, Fibre Expressions, Corolla's, The Landing Clothing and Swish in Gibsons, One-0-One, Dave the Butcher, and East 4th Vintage in Sechelt. Any other ideas for locations, let the committee know.

Program Committee: Report Feb. 2015

Thank you to Lee Ewing for her mini workshops on Bindings. It hopefully helped members to understand the reasoning behind our registration forms and the info asked for.

Mini workshops in March: Carol Bowie will demonstrate the proper quilt sleeves required for a quilt show—the D sleeve. Elizabeth Nordlund will address labelling your quilt and what information needs to be on the label.

Fat quarter draw this month is black and white.

In March we have Hilary Rice coming in from Stirling Ontario. She will make a presentation called "Along the silk road". Her inspirational talk will be about her story as a textile and mixed media artist. She will share her story—a story full of chance meetings and door openings, fun experiments and happy accidents. It is a journey that acts as a conduit for thoughts and ideas—a journey that winds through a progression of art quilts and into a new world of creativity. Hilary will also be doing a two day class called "Imagine and Create". Sign up sheet is at the Program table.

April meeting will have no external speaker as the meeting will be run by the Quilt Show committee in preparation for the upcoming show in May.

Today's speaker Kristin Miller is coming to us from Gabriola Island. She will be taking us through her journey as a quilter and artist. She creates spontaneously, without following a pattern or copying someone else's design. She will also be teaching a one day class tomorrow at Fibre Expressions, there are still a few openings, if interested please see us during the break to sign-up.

Lastly, we thank you for your input and feedback, it really does help us plan for the future. Please keep giving us feedback.

LEADERS AND ENDERS: I love continuous chain piecing. I think it is one of the methods that really saves a ton of time and a ton of thread ends.....

I learned a long time ago to use a folded scrap to sew on and off of at the beginning/ending of a line of chain piecing...you would get to the end of your chaining, and sew onto this scrap, leaving it under the needle of the machine, and snip the threads between it and your piecing behind the presser foot. This always leaves SOMETHING under the foot so you don't start the next line of piecing with long threads that get tangled and get sucked down the needle hole pulling your fabric pieces with it, or worse, have to trim all those, trying to get them in the trash, but finding them ending up more on the floor, and clogging the wheels of your wheelie chair at your sewing machine as you roll over them or around the vacuum beater bar!

When you get to the end of the next chain of piecing, you put another fabric scrap though the machine and trim behind it...then you would go up to the top of the piecing you just trimmed off, removing the fabric scrap (sometimes called a 'thread bunny' by those who use this method) and have it ready for ending the next line of piecing.) I typically had 2 thread bunnies going at any given time, one would be under the foot as the 'leader' to start the piecing with, the next one would be the 'ender' as I ended. The 'ender' becomes the new 'leader' as you start the next line of piecing.

I would continue to use the same scraps to sew on and off of until they were clogged with thread, then that would STILL end up in the trash...and I would start with new ones until they were too full of thread to use anymore.

Then a lightbulb went off. I took a bin of scrap 2" squares that had been accumulating from trimming scraps down, and started using those as leaders/enders instead of a wadded up thread covered scrap. I would sew a light square to a dark square, trim off behind it.....and eventually have a stack of these little "two squares" that I would also use as leader/enders to sew into 4 patches....

The 1st pic shows trimming the other chain piecing I was working on BEHIND the two leader/ender squares that I just fed through the machine.

I am using little spring thread snips that I keep at my machine for reaching behind and snipping. It's easier than trying to get back there with big 8" sewing scissors. The 2nd pic show 2 pairs of 'leader/enders' being sewn into a 4 patch at the ending of a line of chain piecing.

Twelve Essential Skills Every Quilter Must Know | The Inbox Jaunt

THE ESSENTIAL TWELVE

After consulting with over 4000 of my colleagues (Read more [HERE](#)), I have THE LIST: **Twelve Essential Skills Every Quilter Must Learn** in order to create a quilt from start to finish.

1. **Sewing Machine Knowledge**—Every quilter must learn the basics of using their own sewing machines. Necessary skills include oiling, threading, changing a needle, adjusting stitch length and adjusting tension.
2. **Read a Pattern**—The quilter must have a basic understanding of terminology, abbreviations, cutting and sewing instructions.
3. **Cut accurately with a rotary cutter**—This skill includes how to read a ruler, how to square the fabric, where to cut.
4. **Stitch an accurate 1/4 inch seam consistently**—This is a skill that must be learned and rechecked periodically. Inaccurate seam allowances cause distortion (and headaches) when piecing any block or quilt.
5. **Chain Piece** — This method allows for increased quilting efficiency and accuracy. Using “leaders and enders” is helpful here as well.
6. **Pressing Techniques**—The Quilter must understand how to press (not iron) to avoid distorting the quilt block. This skill also includes understanding which way to press each seam and why.
7. **Square**—Fabric, blocks and quilt tops all require “squaring” before cutting to prevent distortion of the entire quilt.
8. **Add Borders**—The quilter must learn to cut and stitch borders correctly in order to prevent distortion of the quilt.
9. **Create the Quilt Sandwich**—layering techniques to prevent folds and ripples
10. **Straight line quilt**—Basic quilting using straight line quilting with feed dogs engaged. (What? no Free Motion Quilting?—While I consider FMQ “Essential”—it is possible to create a beautiful quilt using only straight line stitching!)
11. **Bind a quilt**—The finishing touch to any quilt. Should include a mitered corner.
12. **Label**—The quilt isn't finished until it's labeled!

And I guess we could make it a Baker's Dozen:

13. **Five crock pot recipes** to get you through a week of non-stop quilting!

with input from an experienced fibre artist. Emphasis will be on an imaginative approach to the creation of innovative works. Each participant will create their own sampler using the introduced techniques. Finished works will reflect the individual's experience.

NOTE: There is a \$10 materials fee for this class.

A few items to high light that may be of special interest:

Sunshine Quilt Show Celebrating 25 Years Of Quilting Arts— **1st: 2015 Quilt Show BANNER Challenge**

BANNER CHALLENGE

“Coastal Impressions”

In keeping with our quilt show theme – “Celebrating 25 years of Quilting Arts”, this challenge should be your personal reflection of coastal Impressions and how it inspires your quilting. This banner does not need to be abstract; anything goes just use your imagination.

Banner Challenge Rules

Top side Banner Width must be 25” (inches) in keeping with 25 years of quilting on the coast.

Length can be between 8-10’ (feet)

Banner must have one or more PRIMARY Colors incorporated.

50% or more must be three layers in keeping with the definition of a quilt. i.e. if you plan on using a sheer fabric then strips, appliqué or whatever other technique used needs to be three layers, three layers of anything used in the banner will be accepted. E.g. Three layers of sheer would be classified as quilted.

Banner must be Hangable from the 25” top.

Alternative to Banner:

We know that not everyone wants to create a banner, therefore, if you wish to create a table runner or bed protector or whatever. The choice is yours. The rules for the banner hold for these alternatives as well. Critical is that the width of 25” is mandatory and the lengths must still be between 8-10 feet.

You do not have to make the runner or protector double sided. However Backing used must be in keeping with the theme of your chosen work.

Get a partner or partners and create something wonderful to celebrate our 25th Anniversary, might be more fun that way.

2nd: 2015 Quilt Show Challenge: *“Primary Colours and Beyond”*

“Primary Colours and Beyond”

Keeping with our theme – “Celebrating 25 years of Quilting Arts”, this challenge should be your personal reflection of what your years of quilting means to you. We want you to think outside your box. Create something unique that reflects how special quilting is for you and what it means to you. Make something creative for our 25th anniversary of quilting on the Sunshine Coast.

Challenge RULES:

Measurement of **two sides has to equal 25 inches**. i.e. if length is 12” then width would have to be 13” or if length was 6” then the width would have to be 19”. Your piece does not have to be symmetrical,

square or rectangular. As long as half the measurement is 25”.

Must use **only one** of the primary colors. Primary colors are pure red, yellow and blue.

Must use **two tertiary colors**. Check your color wheels or books on color to determine tertiary colors. A primary mixed with a secondary creates a tertiary colour. Example of tertiary colours: turquoise, blue-violet, red-violet, red-orange, yellow-orange and lime green. Please **do not use secondary colors** which are: Orange, Purple and Green.

You can use tints and shades of the tertiary colors you have chosen.

If using a background it must be neutral in colour such as: black, white, ecru, grey.

Quilts must have appropriate sleeves for hanging. If sleeves are not appropriate the quilt may not get hung.

That’s it for the rules; the rest is up to you. **Remember this is supposed to be a challenge but it should always be fun as well.** Let your creative juices flow and think outside your box. Nothing says that you have to do abstract, anything goes as long as you meet the rules. Make your challenge memorable for our 25th Anniversary.

The Challenge committee reserves the right to disqualify any quilts that do not meet all the rules.

Tablet Bag for Banquet Guests at Quilt Canada 2015

This makes a lovely size shoulder bag and is the perfect project to perfect your machine quilting on !!! The bag fits a tablet (with case) and a few little bits. Please mail your bags to: Pjam Swen, #1507 22 Ave., Coaldale, AB T1M 1E4

Materials:

Main fabric (outside of bag): 20 x 13"

Contrast fabric (inside of bag and both sides of flap) : 30 x 15"

Batting (not too thick : 30 x 13"

Thread to match.

From contrast fabric cut: 1 pce. 2½ x 30"

1 pce. 20 x 13"

plus 2 template pieces (cut with wrong sides together)

Template is at end of pattern.

Construction:

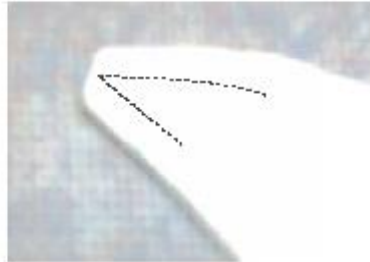
- Place template pieces one each to short end of main and contrast fabric right sides together. Sew with ¼" seam allowance. Press seams open. Don't worry if your "whoosh" goes the other way, it really doesn't matter.
- Layer batting with both pieces of fabric on top (fabrics right sides together). pin securely so it doesn't shift during sewing. Sew all the way around with ¼" seam, leaving an opening on a long seam (about 3" from a corner). Press seam allowance of opening over, so it'll be easy to sew. Trim batting along curved edge.



TIP: machine stitched, machine quilted: Think baby quilt, couch throw, dorm quilt, bed quilt—these are quilts made to withstand the rigors of regular use. Machine wash in warm or cold water. Set the machine for gentle or delicate, at the highest water level and for the shortest cycle. Use quilt soap such as Orvus or a mild detergent. Agitate the quilt for 1 or 2 minutes, stop the machine and soak the quilt for 20 minutes or more, then restart the machine and complete the cycle. To dry, lay the quilt out flat on a sheet or some towels, or machine dry on low.

**You may wish to include washing instructions on your quilt label.*

- Make little clips to the inside curve of the flap to close to the stitching. Trim seam allowance close to stitching at point of flap. Corner cut 90° angles.



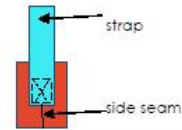
- Turn inside out, poke out corners and flap point, not too hard !
- Topstitch the opening you left for turning VERY close to the edge
- Press edges all the way around while "rolling out" the seam
- Topstitch the **curvy edge only** of the flap. About ¼" from the edge.



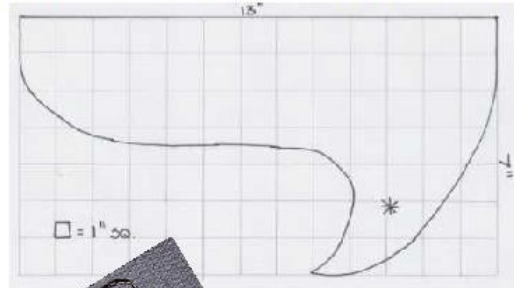
- Quilt the whole thing (including flap) fairly densely (to give extra body to the fabric)
- Fold together lengthwise, so that the short straight edge is ¼" from the flap seam, main fabric sides together.
- Stitch the side seams with a 1/8 to 3/16" seam allowance, making sure to "back and forth" at the top and bottom of each side.
- Turn inside out, press seams, while pushing out the seams
- Fold flap over bag and press folded edge very thoroughly. **Optional:** if you wish to make a closure on your bag, sew button on bag and make button hole in flap (marked by *).

alternately you could sew a large snap to the inside of the flap and on bag, for invisible closure.

- Using the $2\frac{1}{2}$ x 30" strip of contrast fabric, fold both long sides over, so that the strip is folded in thirds (the overlapping long side should not quite make it to the fold of the other side), press. Fold in half and press again. Topstitch twice close to edge or once with twin needles.
- Fold short end over $\frac{1}{2}$ " and topstitch very securely **on both side seams**, making sure not to twist.



I hope you enjoyed making this bag and that you will like it well enough to make it for yourself as well !!
Please note: the ratio length / width in the picture is a little off. It will turn out slightly wider looking.

BLOCK OF THE MONTH TIP:

It pays to spend the time to see just how close to a $\frac{1}{4}$ " your machine is producing. Many patterns default to $\frac{1}{4}$ " seams, others specify SCANT $\frac{1}{4}$ ". Become familiar with what is a $\frac{1}{4}$ " and what is a Scant $\frac{1}{4}$ " as based on your personal machine.

The time spent will assist you in producing consistent $\frac{1}{4}$ " seams and in turn quilts requiring less time in 'squaring up' or even having a square too small to work with. If you have trouble keeping a $\frac{1}{4}$ ", cut 3 pieces, $1\frac{1}{2}$ x 3", sew them together, make sure they measure $3\frac{1}{2}$ ". If not you are not sewing your quarter inch correctly. Once you find the area that makes the $\frac{1}{4}$ " correctly, either mark it with a fine line marker or masking tape.
