
One topic was the poor



You will need to bring four 2- 1/2" width of fabric strips to participate. You may play more than one game so bring 4 strips for each game you wish to play.

Haw Block: the haw block is a 6.5" x7.5" paper pieced tree. Please make sure that you have the corrected directions and make your season block according to your last name.

Challenge Quilt: Wall hanging. Minimum size 18" x 18", Maximum size 40" x 40", viewers should clearly see what season this is by colours or content of the scene. Please have a hanging sleeve system in place, sleeve, stick, tabs, etc. and your name, phone number, and guild pinned to the back.

Merchants' Mall: We will have merchants displaying their goods for sale. We encourage participants to view and possibly purchase some quilting goods that are offered. For more information please contact Terry Phillips at 250-285-3040 or hopespringstudio@gmail.com

The Value and Cost of Making quilts - a response to Quiltonomics By Kathy Mathews,

In the quilt world a recent blog post made quite a splash. Quiltonomics:

The Real Cost of Making Quilts by Jennifer Moore spells out the facts and figures of being a quilter and what people are willing to pay for a quilt. It reminds me of my post about Why I don't Quilt for Money. I think that stats must be staggering for some but I would like to look beyond the money to the value and cost of making quilts.

In her article, Jennifer writes, "What I found jaw-dropping was the statistic that dedicated quilters typically own \$13,000 in tools and supplies, and their fabric stash is worth close to \$6,000."

I would counter that stash and equipment like that, is what a life time quilter has accumulated.

Yes, machines can be expensive, I have a LongArm, I know! But, a beginning quilter need not put anything close to that amount of money. My biggest fear is that this article will scare away new quilters.

I recently wrote my month post for Havels on this very topic of new quilters and how to get them started. I didn't add up the money but to launch Olivia we didn't even approach 500.00 and that encompassed her birthday and Christmas presents for a couple of years!

What I would like to really expand on however, is the value of quilting. Many people who can afford to participate in hobbies for their body, mind or soul. Boats and motorcycles are expensive but people love them. I know folks with vacation cabins and RVs which are not cheap.

I don't think some activities can be viewed with an economic lens, you have to look at the value of the activity. What are the benefits versus the cost?



What is the value of quilting in my life?

Quilting kept me sane during my first marriage. I have quilts which know all about me and my troubles. They helped me cope.

Quilting has allowed me to be creative, use my hands and make beauty. The part of my brain that needs to not only see but be a part of art is satisfied.

Quilting has beautified my home and

those of my loved ones. Out of the emotional support and artistic need very wonderful and practical articles have come into being.

Quilting has made my retirement purposeful and joyful. I have more time to sew and satisfy my tactile needs. I write this blog and feel I have accomplished something. It helped me transition.

Quilting has propelled me towards using and understanding technology. I have acquired new skills creating this blog, meeting quilters on Twitter and posting pictures on Instagram. The motivation to grow and learn was because of the fabric.

Quilting has extended my world of friends. I have become active in my modern quilters guild and met great people. I have made all kinds of Twitler friends on Twitter and even gotten to meet some of them face to face. It's not easy to make new friends unless you are a quilter.

Quilting has made me mentally sharp, happy with friends and activities plus let me create pieces for my loved ones. My life is infinitely better because of quilting.

And sure, it's cost me some bucks. But do you want to know why I continue spending money on quilting?

Because it's worth it and then some.

How to Help a New Quilter Get Started - Tips for fabric, cutting & more!

I can clearly remember signing up for my first quilting class. I had been sewing since I was twelve but as I was about to turn the big THREE – O I felt the need for something new in my life. I had seen a handmade quilt on a bed of a friend of mine and knew that I had to make one. I was pretty set for basic sewing notions but the class list of what I needed to start quilting had some items that were new to me. The list was a bit anxiety producing, thrilling and a tad expensive.

I was self-motivated because we had family quilts. My grandmother and her two sisters had been quilters and exposed me to it. They planted a seed which was dormant for about 20 years but when it blossomed, it grew big time.

I was so lucky to have had someone who exposed me to quilting. I wish everyone did. I have started the wonder that is quilting for me, my step daughter and now my granddaughter. My step daughter was 20 and my granddaughter is only 2 so my approach was and is quite a bit different.

My step daughter lived with us when she was in middle school. It seemed like grades 5 through 8 involved quite a bit of sewing. I made her play costumes, quilts, pillowcases and favors for her birthday parties. She and I get along really well now but then, there were some definite non Brady bunch moments. Sewing was our first and enduring bond.

She became interested in sewing by seeing the things around the house and the handmade items I gave her. I signed her up for lessons, just like I had Shelby and Emily. She made a little quilt in a Mother daughter class and we were all thrilled with it. After she left, she missed the sewing on demand that was available around here. A seed had been planted for her. This kind of exposure is what I am doing with Zara now also, she plays in my sewing room, she adores quilts and sewing is just a part of everyday life.

For Olivia's 20th birthday, she wanted a sewing machine. Her sister and Mom got her one at Target and I begged to help and by help I meant completely control this present. They all agreed to let me, even took the machine back. I was in heaven! The early exposure had taken root and I was about to "water"the sprout completely!

I got Olivia a Bernette**sewing machine**, a necessity for all new quilters. I am all about avoiding play sewing machines or tricky antique ones for young sewists. (I made that mistake with my oldest and I have never heard the end of it.) Buy a lower level mechanical sewing machine of the brand you adore.

After that I put together a quilting sewing kit for her, with some attention paid to a quilt class list. She was not living with me so I wanted her to be completely prepared. She was the only child interested in sewing so far, I didn't want to blow this!

First: cutting. I got her a decent sized cutting mat, quality rotary cutter and replacement blades. I wanted her to have really good scissors so I got my first pair sharpened and passed them on to her. I think being able to cut well is the most important start for a new quilter. And what's the secret to being able to cut well and accurately? Quality tools that cut consistently and last for decades, a bargain in the long run.

Second: measuring. When you cut, you have to be able to measure. There are so many fabulous rulers out there. I chose a simple 18" plastic ruler and a really good 12.5" acrylic square. It's important to cut but it has to be accurate.

Third: sewing. By golly, sewing a quilt does involve sewing. She would have well cut, accurate pieces but she needed a quarter inch foot for that machine and a walking foot for the quilting. Luckily, these are not that expensive for a Bernette. And when

you sew, you're going to make mistakes. It's just part of sewing and quilting. I did not get her as quality a seam ripper as I have, some holiday I will have to upgrade her.

Fourth: Pins and thread. Almost done but sewing involves thread and pins. I have fabulous pins and magnetic "pin cushions" for them. I had hundreds of standard pins and a pin cushion. Before a year was up, I got her a magnetic one. I also got her a big spool of off white Aurifil thread. She has never bought herself a replacement spool of Aurifil but having one luxurious spool is at least amongst her stash.

Fifth: Fabric. Oh yeah, she needed to have some fabric and I think this is where most people start when they sew. We got her a gift certificate to the quilting store for lessons and fabric.

Finally: some fun. Once you have a machine with the proper feet, you can cut, measure, pin and sew that fabric butit's fun to have some extras. I had a sewing basket I had barely used, a measuring tape and some duplicate books. Olivia loved them!

Keeping it going: I have given her gift certificates for more fabric, dual duty thread I no longer want and fabric I can't see myself using. We got her extra bobbins because really, can you ever have too many?
