Program Events—November, 2015

PROGRAMS

In November we have Krista Hennebury coming from Vancouver. Her program is titled "Poppyprint: A Traditionally Trained Modern Maker". Her trunk show includes a presentation on the Modern quilting movement and samples of her work as well as projects from her retreat-based book "Make It, Take It".

She will also have copies of her book ``Make It, Take It`` available at Resource Day for \$30.

In January we will have a Round Table discussion on Colour. We will have several tables of about 8 members each with a facilitator at each table to lead the discussion and help the group understand colours and become more confident with them. Each member will choose a colour and bring 6 - 10 pieces of fabric from their stash in their chosen colour. The fabrics should be in the tints, tones, and shades of that colour. The others at the table will analyze and discuss the fabrics chosen. Discussion will include Primary, secondary, and tertiary colours, Monochromatic colours, Analogous colours, Complementary colours, and Triads.

We are introducing a Stitching Corner next month. Please drop in to stitch on your project during the morning. Thanks to Carol Bowie for this great idea.

WORKSHOPS

Krista Hennebury is teaching a class on Sunday, November 29 at Fibre Expressions. She will teach "Temperature Check", an "Improv Under the Influence" class. She taught this class on an Alaskan cruise, in Inuvik, Sweden, Whistler and to many Lower Mainland modern and traditional guilds and everyone has a great time! There is a lot more than meets the eye with this class. Students will learn the piecing technique, a new way to cut their fabric with traditional rotary tools, pressing alternatives, different layout options and colour relationships, as well as discuss improv walking-foot quilting, thread choices and alternate finishing techniques. Students do not have to make the quilt exactly like her samples. She often supports people in her class to create table runners or placemats if they prefer to use their pieced units in different ways.

We still have some spots available. Cost of the class is \$50. We will have sign up sheets as well as two samples of her work at Resource Day.

Gloria Loughman's 3 classes being offered in September 2016 are sold out! If you want to add your name to the waiting list, please contact Anne Selder, Ada Yeo, or Christine at Fibre Expressions.



Clever fabric storage idea





Welcome to QM Bitty Blocks!

I'm happy to share November's Bitty Block with you—a 3" Friendship Star. These are so cute! Just like all of the other Bitty Blocks we've given the patterns for, these are so addictive—I can't stop making them.

You'll need 2 fabrics for this block: one for the background and one for the star. For my blocks, I used a lighter background and darker star. You could also reverse the values for your star. Another option is to use a third fabric for the star center—so many options!

Friendship Star

Printer-friendly instructions for November's Bitty Friendship Star


Cutting: Background Fabric (light print) 2 squares 1-7/8" x 1-7/8" 4 squares 1-1/2" x 1-1/2" **Star Fabric** (red dot) 2 squares 1-7/8" x 1-7/8" 1 square 1-1/2" x 1-1/2"



First, let's make the triangle-squares. The first thing you'll need to do is draw a line from corner to corner on the wrong side of each background (light) $1-7/8'' \ge 1-7/8''$ square. Pair a background square with a star $1-7/8'' \ge 1-7/8''$ square, right sides together. Sew 1/4'' out from each side of the line. Cut on the drawn line and press the triangle-squares open. Make 4 triangle-squares.

Triangle-squares

Arrange the triangle-squares and patches into 3 rows, paying attention to the orientation of the triangle-squares.



Sew the patches and triangle-squares into rows, pressing seams toward the patches (top and bottom row toward the outside, middle row toward the inside).

Sew the three rows together and ta-da! You have a completed Friendship Star!

Friendship Star

You may notice that I used a directional print for my background. If you would like to keep a similar print oriented in the same direction, here's a little tip when making your triangle-squares. When marking the diagonal line on the back, first arrange your squares so the print is oriented the same on both of them. On the wrong side, draw one diagonal line from top left to bottom right on one square. On the second square, draw the diagonal line from top right to bottom left. Be sure to share pictures of your blocks—we love to see what you're sewing. Use the hashtag **#qmbittyblocks** when sharing yours.

You'll find all of the Bitty Blocks free quilt block patterns on our <u>Bitty Blocks homepage</u>, along with layouts for the row quilts in a variety of sizes.

<u>How to bury knots when machine quilting</u>: To start, thread your machine and pull your bobbin thread up. Pull both threads to the side. Insert your fabric sandwich. Insert the needle into your quilt sandwich. Your presser foot should be up at this time. Now, you want to pull the bobbin thread up and through to the top of your fabric. To do this, put the needle down and bring it back up. Turn the wheel on the side of your machine back and forth by hand a bit while gently tugging on the top thread until you see a loop appear.



Use a stitch ripper to catch the loop and pull the end through to the top. Both threads should be on top of your quilt sandwich at this point.



Put the needle down into the quilt sandwich in the same exact spot that you pulled the bobbin thread through. Hold both threads to the side, put your presser foot down and start quilting.



Once you are a few inches away from the starting point, you should have enough room to bury your knot. Tie a small knot using both of the thread tails.

Thread your tails onto a needle (a self threading needle works very well) and insert the needle into the same hole where the knot is, or just behind it.

Run the needle inside the layers of your quilt sandwich. It is a good idea to double check the back side to make sure your threads aren't visible there. Push the needle to the front of your quilt about an inch away from your starting point.

Pull your thread ends through and give them a gentle tug. Make sure the knot pops below the surface of the fabric. Use a scissors to trim the tails. Your starting point should look neat and tidy on both the front and the back! Isn't that slick?



That's all fine and well...but what do you do when you run out of bobbin in the middle of a quilt and you don't have much of a thread tail to work with? The photo below shows this. There is only about 1" of thread left.

In this instance, I like to flip my quilt over and work from the back side of the quilt. There is only about 1" of thread there, too.

So, I use my stitch ripper and gently take out a few stitches-just enough to give me some decent thread tails to work with.

Tie a knot. (You will notice that I had to tie the knot just above the thread on the right...you don't want to tie it off in the middle of the two threads or the knot will sit right on top of the fabric and it will be hard to bury.)

Thread the needle....and once again, insert it through the same hole that your knot is coming from.

Run the threads through the layers and to the side a bit. Give the threads a tug until the knot disappears under the surface of the fabric. Trim the ends. The knot should be completely hidden. To start quilting again, flip the quilt over and begin in the very same stitch where you ended. Hurray for seamless starts and stops! <u>Author unknown *Editors</u> note: if you wish to look at larger pictures send an email to the editor Karen@klbhr.ca and she will send you the info.

HISTORY

In 1982 a group of women on the Sunshine Coast got together to share their love of quilting. Pat Crucil, an accomplished quilter and teacher, established this first quilt group on the Coast. **Today** the Sunshine Coast Quilters' Guild is the "umbrella" organization for seven local community quilt groups from Pender Harbour to Gibsons, with a membership of 175. The guild promotes the joy of quilting on the Coast by providing enjoyment through quilt shows, classes, demonstrations and displays. We continue to meet eight days throughout our Guild year, from September to May at the Holy Family Parish Hall in West Sechelt (5700 Nickerson Road). Our meetings consist of Mini-Workshops, Business Meetings, Show and Tell, and a Program.

What Sewing Machine Needle Sizes Mean

When a quilter talks about sewing machine needle sizes, they'll say, "It's an 80" or "It's a 12" or "It's an 80/12". Just what exactly do those numbers mean?

The Sizing Systems

The sizes are found on the front of the packaging (circled in red to the right).

That first number is the Number Metric (shown as NM). This system was set up in the 1940's to standardize needle sizes. It is simply the diameter of the needle shaft in millimeters multiplied by 100 to get rid of the pesky decimal places. That means that our standard "80" needle is really .80mm in diameter. (You're glad you asked, right?) What it means to you as a quilter is:

The larger the needle size, the stronger and thicker the shaft.

So where does the '12' of the 80/12 name come from?

It is nothing more than the merging of two measuring systems. The '12' comes from the corresponding Singer or US needle system. The '80', as we've learned, is the diameter of the shaft in millimeters multiplied by 100.

A Sad but True Story

I stood admiring the quilt from afar in a local quilt store.

The thread was so sparkly, so bright, so blue. I was mesmerized.

And to be honest, I wanted some of that luscious thread for my stash.

I drew closer...and closer...

Imagine my dismay, when I realized that the "sparkly thread" was really sunlight shining through the window behind the quilt and through the gaping holes left behind by a needle that was too big.

The lesson learned...?

Test your thread and needle choices first before quilting your quilt!

Make Your Choice

The two most important things to remember about sewing machine needle sizes are:

1. Choose the needle eye based on the thread you use. The thread should pass through the needle eye with the minimum amount of friction.

2. Choose needle sizes just large enough to get the job done. A needle that's too big leaves unsightly holes. *Author unknown google for more information on needle sizes etc.
