Comfort Society Report – October/November, 2017 Report

<u>Donations:</u> In October, we donated 13 baby quilts to the hospital. Also we donated 28 quilts to the Gibsons YMCA Child Care for their preschoolers. They were delighted to receive them and it will go a long way to helping the YMCA with their aim to "provide an environment that helps kids feel at home, learning and growing in a welcoming, safe and stimulating atmosphere." Also, Habitat for Humanity received 2 quilts for their silent auction and gala at the beginning of November. 2 baby quilts were donated to Sunshine Dragons Abreast silent auction -- proceeds to support breast cancer research. 3 quilts were donated to the Vancouver Island Compassion Dogs Society fundraiser -- they train dogs to support veterans suffering from PTSD. 4 baby quilts have also been donated to Houston Flood victims.

<u>Activities & Ongoing Projects:</u> We're taking ongoing donations of placemats to give to individuals receiving Meals on Wheels and for a senior day care program. They are individual-sized and can be of any shape, but aimed at a mature individual. Thanks to members who donated 17 at the October resource day! Also, thanks for the 5 pillow-cases which we'll forward to transition services.

Noriko and Karen B. gave an outreach session at Chatelech Secondary School for students interested in textiles. They showed some quilts and introduced the concept of a consistent and accurate quarter-inch seam (save 'em some grief!) They're planning another outreach at Elphinstone Secondary.

Thanks to the members who took home fabric donations to sort out – please bring back anything else suitable for quilting to the November meeting.

Need fabric, backings, batting, quilt size chart for your comfort quilt? Come by our tables at resource day.

<u>New Projects:</u> The Sunshine Coast Hospice Society, which provides end-of-life support, is interested in receiving lap quilts for the hospice rooms. The idea is that a lap-sized quilt (average size 45 X 60) would be waiting on the bed of a new patient to bring colour and warmth to their room. Then that quilt would go home with the family as a memory quilt when the patient passes away. Approximately 24 patients use the hospice rooms every year and guild members have indicated their support which will be reviewed at this time next year.

Christenson Village assisted living is looking for a few quilt donations to give to residents for Christmas gifts for their annual Christmas party.

Attention art quilters: The new Marine Education Centre at Gibsons Public Market has a space that would benefit from a large art quilt. They have expressed what they would like and if anyone would like to take this on, please contact Elizabeth Byrne.

POSTAGE STAMP QUILTS:


Do you love the look of Postage Stamp quilts but aren't too keen on cutting out thousands of those teeny-tiny squares and sewing them back together again? This tutorial will show you how to make a Postage Stamp quilt block in a flash – by strip piecing. The block will finish at 8×8" in your quilt (there are 64 1-inch blocks in each square) and will look like you spent months sewing it together!

This is a great way to use up scraps or those extra fat quarters from another project. For a truly scrappy block try to use as many different fabrics as possible -25-30 different fabrics for an $8\times8''$ block. You can use less or more, it doesn't matter. What do you have on hand? Use it! Or take one 1-1/2'' strip from every single fabric you have in your stash. You DON'T have to have fabrics that match from a "line" of fabrics. Just pick out some fabrics of all different colors or patterns. Trust me, it will look terrific.

I'm assuming you know the basics of quilting so I won't go into all of the usual – clean your machine, basic rotary cutter safety, using 1/4" seams, how to use an iron, yadda-yadda-yadda.

So let's get started! First, cut your fabric into 1-1/2" strips.





Here's a tip: I like to make myself a grid from painter's tape on my cutting mat. I'll mark arrows on the tape every 1-1/2 inches. *This grid is only used as a guide to make sure I don't cut my strips too short or too wide.*

After cutting the strips, mix them all up in a messy pile. This helps keep everything scrappy.

Chain piece the strips together in twos. Cut them apart and press seams to one side

Put all of these into a messy pile, and chain piece the strips together again, making sets of 4. When you sew them together the seams will all be pressed ONE WAY, so make sure you're sewing them all in the same direction. You don't want the seams all willy-nilly. Try not to get two of the same fabrics side-by-side.

Be sure to press all of these in one direction only. Trust me. One direction only

Put all these into a messy pile AGAIN and sew, chain style, into sets of 8 (you get the drill now – you don't need a picture of these). Once again watch how you sew them so all the seams will face the *same direction*. Press and take these sets to your cutting mat. Cut these 8-strip sections into 1-1/2'' strips.

Put these 1-1/2" strips in a messy pile or if you're like me, put them in nice, neat piles so you can be anal-retentive and match them the way you want

Now chain-piece these new strips together the same way as above. This is where pressing everything in the same direction can help you lock the squares. Just turn the strips in opposite directions so they butt together.

Chain strip 2... Chain strip 4... Chain strip 8... Be sure to press all seams to one side.

You want to end up with a block that is 8 squares x 8 squares. This is where pressing all those strips in the same direction will come in handy. Look at the picture below. Lock the strips by turning each strip in a different direction to sew (horizontal strips), and press in one direction (vertical strips).

Voila! You've got an 8.5 x 8.5" block! When you sew these blocks together, you're going to find that occasionally (or more than occasionally!) blocks of the same fabrics are going to butt together. This happened at the lower right-hand corner of this block. You won't even see it!

APPLIQUE STITCHING TIPS ARTICLE

Number I – Choose the appropriate stitch

When one is deciding on the applique method, you have to think of the desired look of the finished piece. I choose the invisible applique stitch when I want the look of hand stitching, but don't have the time to do all that stitching by hand. I wouldn't do this technique on a project that had a lot of complex pieces. I like to turn the edges of the applique shapes under to do the invisible applique stitch and the more complex the pieces are, I find that I have better control doing the stitching by hand. I'm not saying it can't be done by machine, because anything is possible – it just requires a tad more skill.

Having said that – when I do invisible applique by sewing machine – I choose to use an elongated zig zag stitch. I turn the edges of my applique under by using starch

The one thing to keep in mind about applique is that there are no rules. There are always guidelines that people (including me) prepare for you. Those guidelines are made based on hours and hours of failure – okay, failure is a harsh word. How about hours and hours of experimenting and having fun? Yes – that sounds much better. However, there are times when one bends their own guidelines for the sake of time.

In the example below, I was teaching a jacket class and the jacket had applique on it. The jacket had to be prepped for class and there wasn't enough time to do a blanket stitch around the raw edges of this applique. So I loaded invisible thread on the sewing machine and did an invisible applique stitch around these shapes using the elongated zig zag.

While the job got done, I wish I hadn't been so hasty. I think the applique would've looked much better with a different stitch. But considering that the applique shapes are flannel (they were fused down with a fusible web) and the shapes have a raw edge, there really isn't a lot of fraying.



Why was the invisible stitch faster? Well I didn't have to fuss with neatness on turning the corners because you can't see the stitching. That saved a huge amount of time.

With that in mind, as we move forward with these guidelines, feel free to change them up, break the rules and do what works for you. My only advice is to experiment, make samples and try everything. The more you try, the more you'll know what you like and that means you'll be happy

with your end result.

Number 2 – Choose the right thread

Here's a lesson for all of us. While I do try to keep all my supplies in their appropriate place, I've been known to keep threads and a few other small items with the particular project that I was working on. Hmmmm – then when you attempt to find your brown threads – the memory goes blank as to what project those threads are with!

For invisible machine applique, I like to match the thread color to the color of the applique shape. You can use invisible thread if you like, but I find that invisible does give off a bit of a shine and well – this is supposed to be invisible applique! However invisible thread (monofilament thread) is a good way to get started in invisible machine applique without investing hundreds of dollars in thread.

My preferred thread is a very fine thread – weight of 60 to 100 that matches the color of the applique shape. There are numerous brands of this fine thread out there and I have been collecting them over the years.

Before you panic and think that you have to buy hundreds of thread, remember my dilemma? I couldn't find my brown threads? Well no panic – let's see what else we have that is close. I found these two colors and while they do not look like a match when you look at the thread on the spools, have a look at a single strand of thread on the fabric and I think either one of them will work very nicely.



As I mentioned, you can also use monofilament thread or invisible thread. There are several brands of this thread, make sure you use a good quality one. Some of the invisible thread can be very coarse and you don't want that. You want the fine delicate ones. Monofilament comes in smoke and comes in clear.

Personally I don't use monofilament in the bobbin – I use pre-wound bobbins (with bobbin weight thread) for my invisible machine applique and have been known to use two colors: black

or white. If the tension is set properly on the sewing machine then you're good to go. Sometimes I use the same lightweight (sometimes called bobbin weight) thread in the bobbin that I'm using in the top. In other words, I wind my own bobbins, but I might have one bobbin with red thread and one with green and I use it for any variation of those colors that I'm using on top. Again for the color of the bobbin thread, if you don't have a matching thread, lay out what you have to see if it works. Here I'm using a pre-wound bobbin with a very fine bobbin weight black thread. You can also buy pre-wound bobbin thread in all the colors. I've seen these come in one package which makes it very economical to buy. I do use those bobbins from time to time, but I must confess that I'm lazy and if I can set the tension to work with the same color in the bobbin, it saves time having to change the bobbin.



I can't stress this enough – but choose your thread for the bobbin and the top wisely. Do not 'cheap out' on the threads. If you can't afford to go crazy (and who can?), then buy a couple of basic colors of the bobbin weight thread for your applique. You can get away with a lot when you use neutrals. Greys, browns and taupe's will work on most fabrics. If your applique is bright – then you may want look at buying one spool of each of the main colors. Whatever you do – don't buy cheap thread!

Number 3 – Choose the needle wisely

The same way that you should use quality threads in the sewing machine, make sure that you're using quality sewing machine needles. I like the <u>Inspira</u> brand.

But once you've chosen the brand that you and your sewing machine like, there's a vast variety of needle types and sizes that one must choose from. For 99% of my work, I use the Microtex needles. That's the type of needle. The point is very sharp and I find that it works for most of my projects.

The other thing to consider with needles is the size of the needle. It's a good idea to match the size of the needle to the size of the thread. A huge percentage of problems with sewing is a mismatched combination of needle and thread. If you think about it, the sewing machine is literally punching a hole through your project. If the thread is too small, it can't fill the hole completely and the project doesn't look nice. If the thread is too big, you'll get fraying.

Since I'm using very fine thread, I go with the smallest needle available. That is a size 60/8. A word of caution – this needle is very small as you can see below. The needle threader won't work with it. You'll have to thread the



needle by hand. If you can't seem to do this, then move up to a size 70/10. The needle threader will work with that size of needle

Top needle is a size 12, the bottom needle is a size 8



Sewing Tip: Test your needle by gliding it across nylon hose. If it snags, toss it.
