CQA Report

The CQA Quilt Show is on May 31, June 1& 2. On line registration for classes closes Sunday May 27 at noon. Sales for entry passes close on Wednesday May 30 at 9 p.m.

The Trend-Tex Challenge will be at the CQA Show and is also on line for viewing now. I see Terry Aske has an entry and our Carol Bowie has four. There are 86 in total.

CQA & Zoomer magazine are looking for nominations for a representative of Canadian quilting. This person will be featured in Zoomer Magazine, which is celebrating its 10th year anniversary. June 8 is the deadline for nominations. All the details can be found on line.

The CQA's Big Quilt Bee resulted in over 2,500 quilts been given to Ronald McDonald Houses all over Canada.

There have been over 600 quilted postcards sent in at the end of March so it is expected that there will be close to 1,000 quilted postcards available for purchase at Quilt Canada. All the proceeds will be donated to BC Children's Hospital.



ARTICLE IN THE SUNSHINE COAST HEALTHCARE AUXILIARY JUNE/JULY, 2018 ISSUE

It was the fall of 2012 when the Sunshine Coast Quilters' Guild first gifted 31 small guilts to what was then St. Mary's Hospital. These colourful and comforting quilts were for newborns and this project has been in the works ever since. This August between 780 to 1,050 baby quilts will have been gifted. "There is an average of 130 to 150 babies born on the coast each year," says Karen Biddlecombe, President of the Quilters' Guild and, like many others in the Guild, is also an Auxiliary member. "Our goal is to create a memorable, quality quilt the newborn can enjoy

This sounds like a lot of stitching and Karen explains that the Quilters' Guild, formed on the Coast in 1982, is now divided into seven Satellite groups in different Communities – Cotton Club, Fat Quarters, Gone to Pieces, Halfmoon Crazies, Loose Threads, Off the Wall and Pender Harbour Piecemakers. The project is overseen by the Comfort Society, a committee of eight Guild volunteers.

Elizabeth lauds the quilters —
"their skill and artistry plus their kindness and generosity is amazing." When it comes to warm and fuzzy feelings, what could be better than welcoming a new life onto the Coast? Karen says the quilts are most often left at the hospital once they are informed that a new baby is arriving. How ever, there are times when the quilt is handed directly to the parents and the quilter gets to meet the new baby.

"We do hear from parents who are most appreciative, in some cases, it's the only new gift the baby receives," says Karen. "And sometimes people in the community show us pictures of their toddler who is still attached to their quilt. It's heart warming to see how the gift of a quilt becomes a big part of a little one's life."

Recently a quilter/auxiliary member had a chance encounter on the ferry with a family whose baby had recently been born off-Coast due to complications. As a result, they had missed out on receiving a quilt, so she created a quilt in the next few weeks and delivered it to a very surprised and grateful family.

Hand quilting is a topic near and dear to my heart. It's where my quilting journey began, around a floor frame, quilting with dear ladies possessing far more wisdom than my young self. I cherish those hours spent listening to their stories as we stitched, it was like stepping back in time.

Many of you shared similar stories about hand quilting and what it means to you. As the survey results came in, it was clear this old craft of hand stitching stirred many memories, with nearly 3000 responses and over 6900 individual comments.

When asked to rate the importance of the heritage of hand quilting the results were overwhelming...

54% respondents feel that hand quilting is extremely important 30% feel it is very important 11% feel it is somewhat important.

Hand quilting is history, it's our history, but is also relevant today. Several of you gave some great ways that hand quilting remains a relevant part of the quilting industry today...

Minimal start up costs:


It makes quilt-making more available to everyone since you don't have to pay to get it quilted or buy a machine. It suits a style of quilter that is on-the-go since it travels easily. It is one of the creative expressions in quilting today. It fits into embroidery, needlepoint, and other handwork areas. It is another technique to add to a vast repertoire of sewing Skills. It adds a choice to the quilter's art palette.

There are many reasons given to hand quilt, and often those listed were personal. But several quilters had suggestions of ways they use hand quilting to add something extra to their quilts that they can't achieve another way.

How do you use hand quilting in your quilts?

*Add texture *Add detail *Create natural effects in landscape quilts
*Control of where the stitches are placed *Create unique designs
*Create a vintage style *Precision *Embellishment
*Establish drape of quilt *Mimic the piecing *Specialty threads

Quilters, crafters, and admirers from all corners of the fibre world shared with us their love for hand quilting, whether as their personal oasis, their connection to foremothers, a fun technique in their toolbox, or a finish that pleases the eye and hand. We heard from heritage stitchers focused on passing on the tradition, to big stitch quilters putting a modern twist on a classic technique. Hand quilting has always pushed the quilting industry, and we're excited to see where it takes us in the future
