

Murphy's Law of Sewing (It's just as relevant for Quilters)

Fusible interfacings always fuse to the iron. The Serger only eats the customers garment. If you need six buttons, you will find five in your button box.

The seam you meant to rip out is invariably the other one.

When you are in a hurry, the needle eye is always too small.

The fabric you forgot to pre-shrink will always shrink the most.

The pattern you wanted to make again will have one key piece missing.

If you drop something out of your sewing basket, it will be a box of pins - with the cover off!

Whenever the construction process is going well, the bobbin thread runs out.

The magnitude of the goof is in direct proportion to the cost of the fabric.

Your lost needle will be found by your son, husband, or brother-in-law.....while walking around barefoot.

Facings tend to be sewn to the wrong side (opposite sides attract).

Collar points don't match, and you've trimmed all the seams.

The iron never scorches the garment until its final pressing.

Pant seams always rip where they are most noticeable.

The steam iron only burps rusty water on light silk fabrics.

The sewing machine light usually burns out on Sunday.

Pinking shears get dull just by looking at them. Gathering threads always break in the middle. The scissors cut easiest, past the buttonhole.

- The winning quilt will be selected by Viewer's Choice during Quilt Canada 2019 and awarded a \$100 cash prize.

- All submitted quilts will remain in the possession of the CQA for approx. 11 months and will be returned to the owner/maker prior to Quilt Canada June 2020, in Edmonton.

- The CQA/ACC plans to take these quilts, as part of a travelling show, across Canada. Our Regional Reps and/or Board members will take the quilts to Guilds in their area to share

the talents of our members.

The Challenge:

- The Theme: "Quilting Goes Viral."

- Please use Pantone, colour #18, Ultraviolet (the 2018 Colour of the

year), or the equivalent **KONA** colour, Bright **Periwinkle**, along with up to two (2) additional colours on the face of your quilt

- The quilt perimeter is to be **no larger than 72 inches**.
- Each quilt must be finished with either binding, facings or enveloped pillow case style.
- Please ensure that there is a hanging sleeve, at least 3 inches wide, for display purpose.
- All quilts must have a **label** with the Quilt name and Quilter's name visible on it.

- Please enclose the **Guild Entry Form** when your quilt is shipped. We look forward to your entry and thank you for your participation. Please send some photos of some of your Guild entries for posting on our Social Media sites. Most of all, have fun!

PRESIDENTS CHALLENGE: Be creative and innovative with your project and focus on women, here is how Ada arrived at her quilt.

"We lived in West Africa for nine years where I had a lot of time on my hands and was able to create a lot of needlework. I brought all my pieces back to Canada every summer and stored them in a large tote in my son's apartment. Over the years, I had accumulated a lot but couldn't quite decide what to do with the various pieces. I didn't want to just frame everything and hang it on a wall. So when I needed something for the President's Challenge, inspiration struck. I had two cross-stitch and five dimensional pieces of women. My original intention was to make 12 dimensional pieces to turn into a wall hanging but we returned to Canada and I got busy again. So this is a much more interesting arrangement. I added some typical African huts and some more women from a panel I had and it all just came together. The backing is fabric from Cameroon printed for International Women's Day and shows women doing various jobs with sayings such as "No to domestic violence" and "Promoting our rights". It is printed in both of our official languages since Cameroon is a French speaking country. My women are African because they were created while we were in Africa, **but I would like the focus of the challenge to be on women generally; their rights, accomplishments, and contributions.** I have to thank Tess Strauss of Wildflower Quilting whose beautiful custom quilting made the whole piece come alive. It will be interesting to see how you interpret the Challenge. Please call me if you have any questions." Canadian Quilt Group Wins 1st Place Group Quilt with "Ice Fishing Village"

The Group Quilt Category was very competitive at Spring Paducah 2018.

The first place quilt was "Ice Fishing village" (68" x 45") by the Canadian group,

Les Amies du Quilt.

Take a look at the details in the quilt.

They must have had National Tryouts to get into the group. Fantastic work.

"Ice Fishing Village" also won the OLFA Viewers' Choice Award.

REVERSIBLE QUILT AS YOU GO: QUILT WITH SASHING: This is a '**quilt as you go with sashing**' quilt. The sashing is added as you piece it together. It is fully reversible and looks great in either soft vintage materials or bright modern colours. We have just done line quilting but you can quilt it how you wish. After quilting the finished quilt measures approx. 62" x 52" What you Need: NOTE: I have worked out the yardage based on a 40" width of fabric. If your fabric is wider you may be able to get 4 squares across the wof instead of the 3 squares that I have used in the calculation. Hence you may need a little less fabric. Personally I would rather have a little extra which I can use at a later stage in a crumb quilt or strip quilt.

For the Centre of the Quilt:Colour 1: - 20 squares measuring 10½" x 10½" (approx. 2¼ yards)Colour 2:- 20 squares measuring 10½" x 10½" (approx. 2¼ yards)Batting :- 20 squares measuring 10½" x 10½"

Sashing for the complete quilt:Approx. 1½ yards.14 strips @ 1" x WOF (width of fabric)14 strips @ 2" x WOF

How to Assemble the 'Quilt As You Go With Sashing' Quilt: Create a quilt sandwich with 1 square of each colour and 1 square of batting.

 Make a quilt sandwich as follows:
 Colour 1 – right side facing down
 Batting

Colour 2 – right side facing up. Line up the edges of the fabric and the batting. Quilt as you wish or do some line quilting as we have done. Draw lines 1" apart on the lighter coloured fabric. Line the square up on the mat so that you have approx. ¼" on either side. This will give you a centre line at 5". Pin the three layers together to keep everything in place while you sew. Sew along the drawn lines. Use a walking foot if you have one. Repeat for all the squares. Trim the squares to 10".

Short Sashing Pieces for centre squares.

You will need 15 strips at (10" x 1") - You will also need 15 strips (10" x 2")

Fold the 2" strips in half and press to get a nice crisp fold.

Place a 1" sashing strip to the back of the quilt square and the folded strip to the front of the quilt square. Make sure the raw edges are all lined up. The folded edge of the 2" strips should be facing away from the edge. Sew the quilt sandwich with the sashing in place with a 1/4" seam . Do this with all 20 squares

Lay out the squares how you want them to look. Now we need to join the squares into rows. Line up the 1" strip from the 1st block along the edge of the next block. Pin in place along the edge. Sew with a ¼" seam.

Now place the loose sashing piece over the seam lines. You will notice that the seams will fill the space.

• Topstitch the sashing in place, close to the folded edge. Join all the blocks into rows in the same way. Once all the blocks have been sewn into rows add the long sashing pieces to join the rows together in the same way. as you joined the blocks together. When joining the rows together make sure you line up the sashing strips.

Top and Bottom Borders: Colour 1 – cut 2 strips @ (40" x 61/2")

Colour 2 – cut 2 strips @ $(40" \times 6\frac{1}{2}")$ Batting – cut 2 strips @ $(40" \times 6\frac{1}{2}")$ Sandwich the pieces together the same way you did when you created the blocks. These layers need to be quilted. You can do this in any way you wish, I have chosen to create curved lines. You could also quilt the border in the same way you did the blocks, with 1" lines. Attach the borders to the centerpiece in the same way as you joined the blocks together.


Side Borders: Colour 1 – cut 2 strips @ $(50" \times 6\frac{1}{2}")$ Colour 2 – cut 2 strips @ $(50" \times 6\frac{1}{2}")$ Batting – cut 2 strips @ $(50" \times 6\frac{1}{2}")$ Sashing – cut 2 strips @ $(63" \times 1")$ Sashing – cut 2 strips @ $(63" \times 2")$

Corner Squares: Colour 1 – cut 4 squares @ $(6\frac{1}{2}^{"} \times 6\frac{1}{2}^{"})$ Colour 2 – cut 4 squares @ $(6\frac{1}{2}^{"} \times 6\frac{1}{2}^{"})$ Batting – cut 4 squares @ $(6\frac{1}{2}^{"} \times 6\frac{1}{2}^{"})$ Sashing – cut 4 strips @ $(1^{"} \times 6\frac{1}{2}^{"})$ Sashing – cut 4 strips @ $(2^{"} \times 6\frac{1}{2}^{"})$

Making up the Long Side Borders: Sandwich the batting between one border fabric in colour 1 and one border fabric in colour 2. Quilt as before. Again I am using my Leaves Galore Ruler to create some curved lines. I have used line quilting on the cornerstones, 1" apart, the same as on the blocks. Attach the sashing to the cornerstones in the same manner as we added the sashing to the squares. Attach the cornerstone pieces to the border piece. Attach the 63" sashing pieces to the long borders along the side edges of the quilt using the same method that we used previously. Attach the borders to the quilt. Add the binding and you're done.
