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QUILTERS MEET COVID—19

Hello Quilters – we are now in September and we all know what that means! Sunshine Coast Quilters' Guild meetings start again. But this September is quite different to the past, there is a new issue in town and it's Covid-19. Many of us are wondering how it can still be here affecting us and ask how long. As each month goes on we learn more about it and ways to be safe. But the Board heard loud and clear this past summer, Members do want to continue to participate in Guild activities. The Board has been meeting over the summer putting ideas together on how we can achieve this. So, your Guild meetings are not going to be the same, and while I could just put what we are not doing how about we let you know what we are going to be doing!

How are we going to achieve this? We will be following all Health official's guidelines - no more than 50 at meeting places/events. If you cannot maintain 6' in distance masks are recommended. Outside is better than inside. If inside, restrict time inside. We will be using a numbering system to ensure we follow Health official's guidelines with respect to maximum 50. We will bring our own snacks, drinks in accordance to Health guidelines so no Hostess Groups until further notice. We will be using the newsletter, emails, and the Guild's webpage to communicate to members. We will be using Survey Monkey for voting when/if voting is required.

Current membership has been extended to the end of 2020. If you would like your membership card re-dated to expire: Dec 31/2020, please bring it to the Sept. meeting and the membership desk will take care of this. The membership fee has been halved - so instead of \$40/year it will be \$20/year for the 2020-2021 year only.

Those Members who still wish to participate in Guild activities but not wish to enter the Hall will be able to come to the Hall entrance and a volunteer will help you. There will be a table setup under a tent. We will be making masks mandatory within the hall. There will be copious quantities of sanitizers throughout the hall. Chairs will be setup 6' apart, please do not move them, we will not be having tables to sit at.

Special Speakers - when we have special speakers you will have to sign up ahead of time. Example: in September you can sign up for the October 31st Singing Quilters' trunk show. Information will be in the newsletter and you will be able to sign up via email, phone or come to the hall in September. The 1st 50 who sign up will be able to see the special speaker. Times and information will be in the newsletter.

You can <u>sign up for workshops as soon as you get this newsletter</u>. See the Program Report . We are going virtual for some cherished programs – watch for this information in the newsletter.

Finally, if any Member has safety concerns please speak to a committee member ASAP! And please remember how we setup in September may change in October as we work toward ensuring all are safe yet able to participate. So let's enjoy our time together doing likeminded things and enjoy our Quilting Community!

We can do this with your help and suggestions so please send any tips, etc. to any of your Board Members.

Thanks to all who came with comfort quilts at our last two pop-up days. We received 114 quilts. Wow!

With the new volume of quilts, our storage locker is quite full and we are working hard with calls to community groups. We have just delivered 50. There has been no request for baby quilts since the spring. See below, last year's "Intake and Distribution" report prepared by Jean Whitehead

A total of 58 kits went out last year and 51 were returned (only 7 outstanding to be returned). These seem very popular and we have just put together more for the new year.

Because there will be no quilt show raffle which brings in funds for quilt supplies, our dollars need to last longer. We will be able to purchase only batting for your comfort quilts.

If you cannot attend Resource Days and would like a quilt kit or batting, let us know.

Mask maker, mask maker make me a mask......

Ladies as most of you know The Auxiliary – all Branches – had teamed up with the Sunshine Coast Quilters' Guild earlier this year for mask making, scrub bags and scrub hats as requested from the Sechelt Hospital Foundation. We supplied the Hospital staff with all they requested plus some! Then we moved on to making masks for staff at Shorncliffe, Totem, 2nd Floor S. It was a huge request and was met with wonderful success between the Guild and Auxiliary members.

Many ladies started up their sewing machines which had been waiting in the wings for just such a wonderful cause. We completed our request and a lot of us kept on sewing for family and friends.

Christine Fearn, a local "Sunshine Coaster", kept on with a small team of volunteers distributing masks throughout the Coast only asking for donations to keep being able to buy supplies. She has been able to get many businesses and groups to distribute masks including1670 masks for the Shíshálh Nation.

So now we come to today – Covid-19 as we all know has not receded from our Province and as such more and more businesses and municipal bodies like transit are requiring masks to be worn when entering their premises. Not everyone can sew and not everyone can afford to buy a mask so a call to our sewing machines was made again from the Hospital Foundation.

I am pleased to say I am leading a team of over 30 ladies both from the Auxiliary – all Branches – and the Sunshine Coast Quilters' Guild. We are going to compliment Christine Fenn's team with a goal to supply her a minimum of 2400 masks. This will not be achieved over night; this will take many months of sewing but we are up to it! Because whether a sewer makes 1 or 100 they all get added together and make a difference to our coastal families.

A project like this will touch many lives and make a difference, possibly enabling a family to be safe and reduce the chances of exposure.

Leaders & Enders

Most of us were taught to start and end sewing a seam onto a scrap of fabric. This little scrap could be used over and over again until it became so "fluffy" with thread ends it wouldn't go under the presser foot. Using this method resulted in : less thread wastage, fewer thread nests on the bottom, even stitching, and reduced "fold overs" on the leading edge.

These thread scraps were thrown out – wasted – garbage – no good. You get my point.

Enter leaders and enders. Simply put – exchange two pieces of fabric for your thread scrap. Starting your session with two pieces of fabric, a leader, then continue piecing or chain piecing segments from your project at hand. When you get to the end of your project piecing step, sew onto another fabric pair, an ender. You now have the beginning of a quilt rather than a wasted thread scrap. Eureka.

I usually stop partway in my 'ender' seam. That way when I start up I get some stiches on what has become my new 'leader' then merrily proceed with my project sewing.

The first time the "light went on" was during a trunk show at the Guild meeting – the concept of using scraps was being promoted, and also so-called ugly fabric which needs to be cut smaller to reduce its ugliness. Managing scraps and leftovers into 2 ½ squares and throwing the lot into a box started my journey. Second Eureka.

Using these 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ inch cut squares randomly as my leader/ender pairs, I then sewed the pairs together making strips, and then into blocks of varying sizes – five by five becoming my favourite. The totally random blocks were sometimes a challenge to make them look good, so I soon branched out into what I then called planned random. This resulted in 5x5 blocks of colour groups, or pattern collections. I made many baby quilts using this strategy, adding sashing and cornerstones, borders and such to dress them up a bit. This is not a fast process, remember, I was only creating the fabric pairs or strips in between sewing on a full project. These little squares grew into finished bonus projects.

Over time my design for leader ender quilts has evolved from random blocks, planned random, alternating colour schemes, introducing paper piece animals and even a full sized Irish Chain. ALL of them made from scraps. I have since moved onto scrappy designs, breaking down the pattern into manageable bits that can be sewn as lead-ers/enders into blocks. The pile of blocks then grow into a quilt of desired size. This does add a bit of time into the process as I can't just pull out two scraps, but I will sit for a bit and make up block kits, mixing and matching as I go. I now have sets grouped together in a second box My only rule is I must take from my scrap box and not cut into my regular stash (minor exception sometimes made in the case of neutrals...) New projects always generate some scraps so I seem to have a never ending supply of squares.

A few other notes:

- There is no rule on leader/ender sizes or shapes. Rectangles, triangles whatever works for you will do. You do
 want to keep it relatively simple so that you can pull out a leader/ender pair when needed and don't have to hunt
 and pick, or think too hard.
- A kind quilter pointed me in the direction of Bonnie Hunter, a quilter from the States who is known for scrap quilts and such. Each year she runs a Leader/Ender challenge on her blog and the results are amazing. Look her up under quiltville.com.







Block of the month goes virtual. Use your own fabric. Bring your block to October 31st Resource Day for a chance to win them all.

SCQG - Block of the Month - September 2020 - Bluebird of Happiness Free Pattern is from tildasworld.com

Blocks are made with your scraps.

Background is scraps of whites, off whites, cream and light beige. Mix up the background.

Bluebird is scraps of light, medium and dark blue scraps.

Bird beak is yellow.

Package block in a zip-lock baggie with your name on it and bring to September Resource Day. You may enter more than once. Indicate on the baggie how many blocks are in your zip-lock. Winner takes all!



2 The block uses units that have a triangle created on a corner, so we will show this technique first. Take a **b** rectangle and one **c** square. Pencil mark a diagonal line on the wrong side of the small square and place the square right sides together with the top right corner of the rectangle, with the marked line angled as shown in **Fig C**. Pin if needed and then sew along the marked line and trim off excess fabric ¹/₄in (6mm) outside the sewn lines. Press the triangle outwards.

3 Four other units in the block need corner triangles using the same technique – see Fig D for the fabric and triangle positions.

4 The other units to make are half-square triangles (HST). Make one HST as follows. Take one print g square and one solid g square and cut each square in half along one diagonal to make two triangles from each square (Fig E 1). Pair up two different triangles, place them right sides together and sew a ¼in (6mm) seam along the long diagonal side. Press the seam open or to one side. Check the half-square triangle unit is 2in (5.1cm) square. Repeat this to make a second HST unit, this time using the fabrics shown in Fig E 2. Use this same HST technique and the **m** squares to make another HST unit (Fig E 3). This time, the unit should be 4in (10.2cm) square once sewn.

5 To assemble the block, take all of the units you have made, plus pieces **a**, **l** and **n** and arrange them into columns, as shown in **Fig F**. Sew the units together as shown, and press. Now sew the four columns together, as in **Fig G** and press.

6 To add the border, take the two o pieces and sew them to the top and bottom of the block (Fig H) and press. Check the block is $13in \times 12in (33cm \times 30.5cm)$.
