APRIL PROGRAM RECAP:


- Ongoing projects:






Val Marus – this needle threader is a big help in threading the needles for all the hand stitching I do.



Helen Blank - Here are two photos of some of my greeting cards made from card stock and fabric.

My original idea was to use the sewing machine to sew lines onto these cards, but so far have enjoyed the results of using just Trans-Web as the iron-on glue. This has been my first time experimenting with any kind of iron-on gluing. I am a fan of it now, and imagine I might want to do some fabric appliqué projects next.

I've also embossed some subtle designs onto the card stock. The embossing isn't visible in these photos.


Karen Biddlecombe – well its all finished.! It took over 1 ½ weeks to quilt. I used 7 colors for the top and used up 9 'M' sized bobbins for the bottom. Superior Threads 40wt on the top and 50wt for the backing.

FMQ and Ruler work is what was used throughout this piece. I used 3 types of rules (1 short straight, 1 long straight and 1 curved ruler) Once bound it measures 102" x 104".

The colors were chosen by my friend Lynn S & colorway was by Anne Hall. Piecing and quilting by myself. This is a Judy Niemeyer paper-piecing project.










Noriko – My favourite tool is my iPad that sits on my sewing machine and I watch TV shows on while sewing!

Marian W – Cards made using some circles left from reverse applique projects.




Marian W – A couple of tools I use regularly. In the middle is a tool like an Awl but much more solid. Use it every day!

And to keep my machine's clean - this tool attaches to the vacuum. I also use it to vacuum other small spaces like computer keyboard, small corners.





The 2nd day was what Peter called "Overlay Quilting" - match-stick quilting, grid quilting, quilting outside the ditch. I had to add some circles after the class as the 20" x 19" piece was so linear. I will use these techniques in the future.










Bernardine Somogyi – I gave it a try and made a postcard mug rug! This will be mailed to my sister in Victoria!

Elizabeth Byrne – Emmeline retreat bags.


