GETTING TO KNOW YOU

Each month your newsletter editor will interview one member to be featured in the newsletter. Do you have suggestions for people to be featured? Here's the 6th for this year: Thank you Pauline.

Pauline Weber - one of the very early members of SCQG

How long have you lived on the Sunshine Coast? If not for ever, what brought you here?

I moved to the Sunshine Coast in late1981 to take a job as an ultrasound technician at the hospital. I was born and raised in Kamloops. When I was 13,

we moved "next door" into a house my Dad built.

When and why did you start quilting? Mentors?

A lady from my church introduced me to Pat Crucil, so by 1982 I was part of the quilting group. Our first project was a sampler quilt with each member making their own quilt. This was based on the book "The Sampler Quilt" by Diana Leone. We met in each others homes and that person demonstrated a block and then the rest of us went home and made that block for their quilt. I had mine hand quilted and finished by 1983. I have been a needleworker for a long time. I can credit my mother with teaching me to knit, crochet, tat, and embroider. I learned to sew in high school which led to sewing clothes for myself and later for my 2 boys.

What makes the Guild important to you?

I have enjoyed taking many courses through the quilt guild as it's always nice to learn things. The Guild is also where I have met so many lovely ladies.

THE COMFORT SOCIETY

The Comfort Society is a registered society and part of Sunshine Coast Quilters Guild supporting the creation and distribution of quilts in the community - all members of our guild are members of the Comfort Society. Since its inception, the Comfort Society has provided thousands of quilts to individuals and organizations on the coast and sometimes further afield. It is also responsible for organizing raffle quilts in conjunction with SCQG Quilt Shows.

THE COMFORT SOCIETY COMMITTEE: (aka the CS Gang)

JOB DESCRIPTIONS:

<u>President</u> – arranges CS meetings, writes report for Newsletter, attends Guild Executive Meetings.

<u>Secretary</u> – takes minutes of meetings, liaises with President and Treasurer.

<u>Treasurer</u> – writes cheques, maintains bank account, purchases items approved by committee.

All members of the committee participate in the committee functioning.



Each job is overseen by one individual with assistance from other committee members.

Fabric Manager: Collects fabrics donated, organizes into bins by size and colour. Brings and returns fabrics from locker to Resource Day. Organizes committee to make quilt kits.

<u>Batting Manager</u>: Manages batting. Brings and returns batting to Resource Day. Cuts batting for donated quilts made by members. Advises Treasurer when batting supply is low.

<u>Registrar</u>: Registers all quilts donated with number (yr, mo, number), name of quilter and a short description of the top on registration slip and in computer on master list. (Quilt collection is from July 1 to June 30 each year.) Registers all distributed quilts by date and place donated on master list.

<u>Baby Quilt Manager</u>: Collects baby quilts, stores in locker, maintains contact with Maternity Dept. at Sechelt Hospital. Provides baby quilts to Maternity as needed. Provides Registration slips to Registrar person for quilts distributed to the hospital for documentation on master list in computer.

Quilt Distribution Manager: Organizes quilts distributed to eligible organizations/individuals in the community. Provides registration slips with date and place distributed to Registrar person for entry in master list.

Raffle Quilt: CS Committee members are responsible for organizing Raffle Quilts for SCQG Quilt Shows.

Raffle Quilts require:

- individual to organize Gaming Licence
- individual to be responsible for Ticket Sales
- individual to oversee making of guilt

Hello Quilters.

BLOCK OF THE MONTH

"Depression Block"

For assistance call: Eileen Evans 604-885-3565, Donna Thompson 604-740-0020 or Deb Burton 604-885-1980

The block measures 12 ½" square unfinished (12" square finished).

The block is to be submitted at the March resource day.

This block will be made with fabrics from your stash.

The light areas are to be off-white, tone-on-tone fabrics. The dark areas are colors of your choice.

Instructions:

- 1. Cut 8 4" squares of off-white fabric.
- 2. Cut 8 4" squares of dark fabric.
- 3. To make half square triangles (HST):
- a. On the back side of the off-white fabric, draw a diagonal line from corner to opposite corner.
- b. Place the right side of an off-white square to the right side of a dark square.




- d. Press to set stitches.
- e. Cut along the drawn line to make to 2 HST.
- f. Press seam allowance towards dark fabric.
- g. Trim to 3 1/2" square.
- 4. Lay out blocks according to diagram to place light and dark fabric.
- 5. Sew blocks into rows, pressing seams to one side and all in the same direction.

Alternate direction of seam allowances on rows (the seams will nest when sewing the rows together).

6. Sew rows together pressing all row seams in one direction.

Note: Do not trim unfinished block.






CQA Highlights for March





Monthly Skill Builder Challenge

8 monthly skills - in 12 ½ inch blocks

Month 6: Paper Piecing



Have you tried this yet?? It is a technique that uses a design drawn onto a foundation of paper or newsprint, and then fabric is sewed onto the paper – almost like paint by numbers for quilting. When you are finished – tear out the paper and you are done. This technique is used to achieve precision piecing (well most of the time). There is also another way of accomplishing this using freezer paper – without all that paper ripping! Be aware – this is not to be confused with English Paper Piecing – an entirely different kettle of fish.

For this month you are challenged to make a 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ inch unfinished block using foundation paper piecing techniques. The technique is up to you – perhaps try more than one for your block, or make two blocks. The block will measure 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ inch square, and when sewn into a quilt will measure 12 inches. Magic.

Some of these projects can be very intricate – think Quiltwork© or BeColourful©, or more basic designs that will benefit from high precision. It really is a good way to achieve long crisp points and to manage small pieces. Many of us were first introduced to this technique from a prolific designer – Carol Doak©. If you search the internet (or perhaps your library) you will find references and instructions she has written.

A very abbreviated description: a mirror image of the design is drawn on paper, the sewing sequence is indicated and sometimes a pattern is divided into sections that you need to assemble to complete the design. By careful cutting and placing of the fabric pieces, and following the sewing lines on the paper you will end up with a high degree of precision. With freezer paper you do not sew through the paper – you use the folded edge of that paper to stitch against. Freezer paper has a thin coating of plastic (not wax) which, when heated, will adhere temporarily to the fabric. Freezer paper patterns can be reused multiple times. (8 times for me so far). Pro Tip: Protect your iron and surface with parchment paper.

You will find numerous instructions online. On first glance they look like mental gymnastics; persevere and you will love your results.

A few useful tips....

- The add-a-quarter ruler is a GREAT tool, the plus version provides for precision trimming and improved security and safety for your fingers whilst trimming
- For a folding tool use a postcard or a piece of flexible cutting board (from any Dollar Store)
- Repositionable glue stick by Scotch is the latest and greatest tool for paper piecing. It leaves no residue! Available from Staples (on-line only) or Amazon
- A light table is handy to make fabric placement easier but is not a necessity





- It was decided that a Zoom meeting would be planned for next February enabling us to have a speaker from further away.


CQA:
