Membership Committee Procedures

The membership committee is responsible for maintaining the membership list, issuing new membership cards, storing completed membership forms, taking attendance at Resource Day Meetings, recording visitors, printing name tags, selling pins and patches, choosing door prize recipients, and preparing deposit slips for funds collected by membership after each meeting.



New and existing members pay their fees in person by cash or cheque or by e-transfer. The treasurer notifies the membership committee regarding e-transfers received. The membership committee completes a new membership card for each member, after payment is received. The card acts as a receipt.



GETTING TO KNOW YOU

Each month your newsletter editor will interview one member to be featured. Do you have suggestions for people to be featured?

Have you noticed a young person in our midst and wondered just who she is?

Madelyn Provost: new guild member

PhD candidate Simon Fraser University

How long have you lived on the Sunshine Coast? If not for ever, what brought you here?

I grew up in Ottawa, and went to school at the University of Waterloo and the University of Toronto, where I did my Undergraduate and Masters of Arts degrees in the Study of Religion. I was especially interested in the ways people found to combine their religious beliefs and practices with seemingly contradictory elements of modern society. For my Masters research, I studied a Catholic HIV/AIDS organization in Kampala, Uganda, and looked at how the changing nature of HIV care and experiences interacted with individual's religious beliefs. Doing fieldwork



abroad as an outsider presents a lot of ethical, personal, and financial challenges, so I knew I wanted to pursue a PhD project in which I was more of an insider to the community. Initially, this led me to looking at settler colonial museums in Ontario.

With this project, I had hoped to understand how the growing importance of reconciliation and land back for Indigenous communities was being handled by museums and communities that were proud of and financially dependent on their settler heritage. As I dove deeper into the topic during my first couple years in the Anthropology department at Simon Fraser University, I became more and more interested in people at the museums that were re-enacting traditional handcrafts: woodworking, printmaking, baking, sewing, weaving. Quilters from Ontario will likely remember seeing these re-enactors at Upper Canada Village, which was to be one of my field sites. As a knitter and stitcher, I had a personal interest in this topic, and it quickly became clear it was a better fit. But, looking only at this handful of people would be too narrow of a topic for a PhD Dissertation, so I expanded my population to include artisans. This led me to the Sunshine Coast: if I were studying artisans, I should look at a more established artisan community. My supervisor, who occasionally vacations in Sechelt, knew that the Coast had a large artist/artisan community, and suggested it as a potential fieldsite. After researching the Coast and learning about the vibrant fibre arts community, it was clear that the Coast was an ideal location.

Aside from the fact that the Sunshine Coast claims to have more artists per capita than any other region in Canada, the area is a great place to do my research because of its size. It's large and active enough that I am kept busy: in addition to improving my skills through the Quilter's Guild and the Halfmoon Crazies, I spend time with the local Fibreshed, the Spinners and Weaver's Guild, FibreWorks Studio and Gallery and the Knitting a Community group. Depending on the group, I'm typically volunteering, taking workshops, teaching classes, or hanging out and stitching, spinning, knitting, and weaving. Every week offers workshops and classes, quilt/spin/knit-ins, and informal gatherings of artisans. The many markets, artisan fairs, and art crawls offer even more opportunities to interact with the community. But, the Coast is also small enough that I don't have to miss much. If I did this research in Vancouver, I'd have to make a lot of hard choices about where and with whom I spent my time, and I think I'd have a much harder time getting a sense of the community as a whole. Additionally, everyone seems to know each other! People I speak to always have suggestions of who else I should talk to. As a researcher, this is incredibly helpful.

Mentors?

In the SCQG, a few people have been excellent mentors (formally or informally) in my stitching and quilting journey. Trish Clooney and Margaret Stewart are incredibly patient with all of my questions about quilting, and endlessly supportive and encouraging. Alexis Bachs and FibreWorks Studio and Gallery have been wonderful sources of inspiration and skill-building. And, Catherine Nicholls has been a wonderful mentor, helping me find my place and style in the quilting world, and offering an example of a successful creative career.

What makes the Guild important to you?

Through these wonderful groups and connections, since May of 2022 I've been working on answering my research questions and developing themes that will inform my dissertation. One thing I am pursuing is the way artisans engage with place: how do artisans change the Sunshine Coast, and how does living on the Coast impact their work? The upcoming Quilt Show theme, "Coast Inspired," is an excellent example of this. Another way this shows up is in the ongoing challenge of finding permanent places for artisans to store equipment, hold meetings and workshops, and gather socially. A theme that has emerged through lots of talks with community members is our emotional relationships with things – especially our stashes. I've found that stashes (of fabric, yarn, or fibre) can elicit feelings that range from fond appreciation to deep anxiety, and even prompt us to consider our own mortality. I hope my dissertation will tell a story of what it means to be a fibre artisan on the Sunshine Coast, and show how fibre artisans engage with important and complex social issues through their fibre work.


One impression I've had of the Coast is its ability to attract people with clear visions of what they want their lives and community to look like, and the passion and drive to take action to accomplish those visions. The many non-profits, societies, guilds and other organizations, many of which are run through volunteer labour are a testament to this. But, I've also heard from members of such groups that this is a challenge of living on the Coast: passionate volunteers devote tons of time and energy into a project, then become overburdened and struggle with delegating tasks to others. Therefore, one thing I find especially impressive with the SCQG is the level of active membership, participation, and leadership the group maintains. I was shocked when I saw how many people attended a recent monthly Guild meeting. People often say that "you get out what you put in," and the SCQG is a perfect example of this. Behind every exciting, engaging, and well-attended meeting and workshop are a lot of dedicated volunteers and willing participants.

Little known facts about Madelyn:

When I finish my fieldwork on the Coast in June of 2023, I'll return to my apartment in Burnaby where my partner and cats are. My partner Todd is a structural engineer with a passion for plant life, and my cats are Maya (14 years old, fluffy, beautiful and sweet) and Chapo (a 6 year old rescue, goofy and chaotic). There, I will continue analyzing the data I've collected and write my dissertation, with the goal of defending it by the end of 2024. After I complete the degree, I hope to pursue a career that will allow me to continue combining my passions for research, writing, and fibre art.

Editor's Comment: Welcome to the Coast Madelyn. We look forward to seeing you out and about AND seeing the results of your research.

I WOULD CALL THIS FAMILY HISTORY! An incredible story!

How many are lucky enough to trace their family roots to the early 1800's?

This Double Irish Chain Quilt was made by my great, great Aunt Rachel Clark who was born in 1818 in Bridgetown, Nova Scotia. As did all young ladies of that era, she "sewed a fine seam".

Bedding was one of the big items meticulously sewn for each and every Hope Chest. Rachel, by age 18, had a well prepared chest with at least 5 guilts, numerous pillowcases, pillow shams and sheets.

This Double Irish Chain quilt and an appliqued Oak Leaf quilt were handed down to my grandmother and were in regular use in her home from 1920 - 1940 when it was decided to put them away to save for future generations.

In 1990, this quilt was archived by the British Columbia Heritage Quilt Project in Langley and it was determined to have been made before 1836, making it 186 years old now in 2022. It is not only hand quilted but it is also hand pieced. The old cotton batting has shifted a little over the years but since the quilting is spaced 8

stitches to the inch, it has kept the quilt together.

I hang this quilt on a quilt rack in my living room and I often display it along with Rachel's hand made pillow shams in my spare room on the antique wooden bed which was bought in 1882 by Rachel's family.

I have showed this quilt and several other items made by Aunt Rachel at the Fibre Arts Festival in Gibsons in 2006 and also at the Sunshine Coast Quilter's Guild in 2007 but prior to this, the quilt was stored away in a trunk. It's a real pleasure to be able to show this to an appreciative audience. I'm not sure they have ever been shown to anybody anywhere else except to the Sunshine Coast quilters.



HOW TO REGISTER AND PAY FOR A WORKSHOP:

- 1. At Resource Day sign up in the book for that particular workshop. If there is a waiting list, you will be notified at the time.
- 2. Outside of Resource Days you must contact Darlene Finch to find out if there is space available. Once this has been confirmed then payment is required.
- 3. PAYMENT: We take cheques, cash and e-transfers at treasurerscqg@gmail.com

If you pay by e-transfer, it's a 3-part process:

- i. You advise Darlene Finch that payment is going to go by e-transfer (email or phone call)
- ii. The e-transfer message box is where you tell the treasurer what you are paying for, example: colouring cloth January 29.
- iii. The treasurer then advises Darlene Finch that payment has been received from whom and for what.

Different to pre-Covid days, we only register 10 for in-person workshops. Sign up early to secure your spot. Note that payments are non-refundable unless the Guild has to cancel the workshop.

QUILT SHOW CHALLENGE THEME: CIRCLING BACK

CRITERIA: Size – minimum 8x10 inches and maximum 20x20 inches.

Must have a curved edge within the design: e.g. circle, wavy lines, rocks, cobblestone, sunflower, sun, half moon etc.)

Must use in some way or fashion on the front of the quilt: Country Fair fabric* You can use a little or a lot!

Must be a guilt: (3 layers) and binding

Sleeve for display

*FEE: \$5.00 for a quarter metre strip (10x44 inches) Fabric name: * Country Fair

We started selling the quarter metre strip at the October 2022 meeting. We have sold 20 so that's great! Note that we have a maximum of 44 strips to sell so that's 24 left for others to buy.

Thanks to Bernardine for donating the fabric to the Guild for the Quilt Show challenge. Finished quilts will be displayed and silent auctioned. All proceeds will return to the Guild for quilt show costs or to the Guild/Comfort Society.

FUNDRAISERS FOR THE GUILD FOR SALE

QUILTED ID/BADGE/\$\$\$/CREDIT CARD/CELL HOLDERS:

These badge holders are multi-faceted for use: You can just wear at a function where you are having your name shown in the badge holder section. Or when hiking or shopping around town and don't want to carry a purse. Need to carry your cell around your home? This is a great way to keep it close to you but not in a pocket. Below the

badge section (clear vinyl) is a zippered pouch which just fits a driver's license or money to keep safe. On the back side is a mesh section which is large enough for your cell phone. There are a few holders that have straps long enough to cross your body if that works for you vs. around the neck.

In addition, top quality webinars continue to be offered each month on Zoom.




